ALASTAIR ALLCOCK

9th January 1934 – 6th January 2021



I first came across Alastair because of his leadership of men's outreach work. He had a wonderful heart for evangelism especially amongst men, recognising that in modern Britain working men often seem the most resistant to the call to follow Jesus and often the hardest people to engage because of their busy-ness. For many years he was the Fairfield coordinator for Christian Viewpoint (then Vision) for Men and my first meetings with him were pub breakfasts and other events he had organised.

Alastair was great at welcoming people in the Fairfield foyer with his lovely clear voice and his gentlemanly and imposing presence, many peoples' first experience of Fairfield was Alastair. As Siobhan Frost wrote to me 'He was such a gentleman and I will miss seeing dressed in his smart clothes (he never looked messy he was always dressed graciously)'. Alastair was so welcoming and so interested in people and he was also a strong and faithful follower of the Lord Jesus who has had a great impact and influence upon the life of Fairfield Church.

Alastair came into Church membership in 1962 and apart from several years when he was away studying and his time in the British Embassy in Washington in the 1980s, he has been a member and attender of Windsor Hall/Northwood Hills Evangelical Church/Fairfield Church ever since. He became an Elder in 1975 and continued as a leader of the Church (apart from when in the USA) until about seven years ago. He became a Trustee in the 1980s, only stepping down recently. He was a regular teacher and preacher until about eight years ago and he has led a Fairfield House Group for decades - until just before Christmas last year!

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Alastair is an example of someone rightly described and honoured as a 'pillar' of our Church having had such a great influence and role for so many years.

Alastair also modelled to us all the dedication and discipline of someone who had committed themselves to follow Jesus and to serve His people. Until health issues very recently, he was always at every Sunday service, every monthly prayer meeting and the evening breaking of bread service.

When he prayed, he prayed with faith, with intelligence and with sensitivity. Anca Ostas (who got married to Kevin from New York at Fairfield) said 'I will never forget how Alastair prayed for me before I left England and how Rosemary and Alastair opened their house to me and Kevin. It really feels like they respond when God is sending them to love others.'

Alastair Allcock was gifted by God to bless Fairfield Church with his leadership, his teaching, his heart for evangelism and his faithful service for more than 50 years!

He was right, as he was about a lot of things!

Alastair was a friend who I enjoyed many lovely chats with over the years, about all sorts of things. He was gracious and kind, resilient and steadfast and he had a lovely way of telling anecdotes and snippets of news.

It was through Alastair that I learned all about the history of Fairfield and the house it was named after. Despite a career across continents and many achievements he was humble and self-effacing and was generous with his interest and time.

I got to know Alastair since I started going to Fairfield in 1994. I cannot outline here all the practical ways in which Alastair and Rosemary have shown their love for my family and I. I knew Alastair was genuinely interested in me as a person. He would speak to me on Sundays after the service. He would ask me about my studies, my family and my country. His interest and ministry of encouragement continued even after I returned to Ethiopia. He kindly accepted my request for him to serve as a trustee of the Ethiopian Graduate School of Theology... From very early on, Alastair and Rosemary would invite me to their house for Sunday lunches. After lunches, I would offer to wash the dishes, but I was a slow dish-washer. Alastair would persevere with me in the kitchen answering my questions (even if they were sometimes culturally insensitive) and listening to my stories. Sunday lunches enabled me to be close to the whole family.

Alastair and his family set an example for me through the ways in which they handled the tragic loss of their son and brother. A few years later, I myself lost my younger sister. He was one of the first people to arrive at my flat. And this was the passage he read:

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God (2 Co 1:3-4 ESV).

I am sure these same words of Paul have resonance for his grieving family. May our Lord comfort each of you!
