Memories from current Church Members and 'old' Tiddlywinks mums from the 1980's Vanessa was one of those very special people in life, someone for whom things seem so tough and yet who seem also to rise to overcome in each situation. Lucy and I feel very honoured to have got to know her well as a friend and a sister in Jesus through being in the same house group for all our time at Fairfield.

Vanessa was not defined by her physical limitations but by her strength of character, determination and continued trust in God and His love and care for her. She was a very independent person yet was able to receive love and support when she needed to with thankfulness, dignity and humour. She was a wonderful wife and then carer for Frank in his last couple of years as well as playing a loving, caring and supportive role in the lives of all in her family. In our House Group each week she would share news, good or bad, about different members of her family or SAMS or a social issue she was engaged with, and we would pray with her for God's will to be done and for her to be equipped, sustained and given wisdom. She was a very brave person too and was able to speak to organisations and local authorities to get fair outcomes, whether for wheel-chair-using bus passengers or for her mother in finding a residential home.

Vanessa was very strong-willed and knew just what she wanted and she didn't like to compromise. She worked hard to keep her garden under control and on one occasion I foolishly offered to come and help. This quickly turned into four of us working through a very hot day on a major 'water feature' construction project that involved shifting a huge amount of clay and large rocks – under the direction of her engineer friend, Steve! She wanted it done well. (contd on the next page)

We met as a House Group this week and felt deeply the absence of Vanessa who was such an integral part of our fellowship. She was there most times when we met during the 12 years we have been in the group or, if she was missing, there was a reason which she told us in advance. With support from Alan she was able to set up her phone and computer so as to join our zoom house groups during this last year too. She will be greatly missed.

Especially over the last few years, I have had many opportunities to meet with her to talk and pray, frequently dealing with hard topics and yet mostly I came away so glad I had had the opportunity to spend time with her. Her faith in her loving and good God enabled her to face so many challenges and, even when we were without words because of the circumstances, she still held on to God trusting him because, as she said at times, 'what else could she do'! In one of the last conversations I had with her we talked about the high risks of the operation that she was hoping for that might have restored some strength in her left arm (which was failing). It was clear to me that she wasn't concerned about dying if that was the outcome of the operation but that she would have hated living in a totally dependent state. We prayed together and I sensed she was ready to go to be with her Lord and was starting to anticipate having a new and transformed body in the Kingdom of heaven! Vanessa, we love you and we will miss you for now.

For many people such an overwhelming challenge could have resulted in rejecting the faith she had so recently professed, but for Vanessa it was a time when her faith grew steadily despite the circumstances. Life had not been easy for her previously, but it grew harder as the years passed. Yet when she heard the Holy Spirit speaking to her heart and convicting her of something wrong in her life, she was willing to obey - even though such obedience seemed to reduce the support she relied upon day by day.
